In these unusual times, with so many uncertainties and unknowns, it's very comforting to realize what an outstanding staff we are blessed to have at Gateway. From our administrative staff, teachers, paraprofessionals, custodians, maintenance staff, cafeteria staff, technology staff, central office staff, nursing staff and all of our specialists in counseling, speech, vision, autism, OT/PT and other therapists, we've experienced staff members nimble enough to adapt to the changed circumstances brought about by the pandemic.

I suspect that this is also evident in our town officials and staff that keep things running, the lights on, and the bills paid despite the challenges. Also, a special shout out to all the first responders and front-line staff that continue to serve all of us in spite of the risk of infection, the unknowns of the virus, and the lack of essential personal protective equipment.

So thank you for all you do, for being patient with the changes, collaborative when dealing with problems, innovative in surmounting challenges, and most of all, for being such a valued member of the Gateway community. I certainly look forward to the day when things return to a more "normal" status, but until then, stay well, be safe, and enjoy the spring weather as much as you can. You've all earned it.
